COMMUNITY FUTURES EAST INTERLAKE OVERVIEW

Community Futures East Interlake Inc (CFEI) is a non-profit community-based Economic Development Organization. Community Futures (CF) is an initiative of the Federal Government of Canada, and administered by Western Economic Diversification Canada. CFs operates across rural and Northern Canada as a grassroots driven program created to stimulate and strengthen rural economies.

Mission Statement

"Community Futures East Interlake, Inc. strengthens communities in the region through innovative business and community economic development support services."

CFEI is one of 16 Community Future Organizations that operates in the province of Manitoba. The region represents local municipal governments, businesses and local economic development groups within the East Interlake region. It is governed by a dedicated Board of Directors, each representing one of the areas which comprise the East Interlake region.

At Community Futures, our commitment is to facilitate the processes involved in all aspects of community economic development, including job creation, community decision-making, organizational development and long-term viability and prosperity.

In fulfilling this commitment, *Community Futures East Interlake* recognizes that a number of regional needs must be addressed. These needs are developed along 3 main themes - Business Development Services, Business Financing and Community Economic Development Planning.

Business Development Services

Community Futures East Interlake provides general business counseling and technical assistance in the development and planning of a new business or business expansion. This includes many services and involves all aspects of starting and running a business, including:

- ☞ Business plan development
- ☞ Feasibility and market analysis
- ☞ Marketing
- ☞ Bookkeeping
- ☞ Financial statement analysis and cash flow projections
- ☞ Accessing financing
- ☞ Access to resource and research material, including access to one of the largest collections of business and trade information in Canada.
- ☞ Business training, seminars and referrals to additional professional services.

Self-Employment Program is a partnership between *Community Futures East Interlake* and Employment Manitoba (Entrepreneurship, Training and Trade) where the objective is to assist eligible unemployed individuals to achieve economic self-sufficiency through the creation of their own jobs. This program provides participants with the training and support necessary to start a business while receiving financial benefits in the first months of establishing a business.



Business Financing

Once a business plan has been developed, *Community Futures East Interlake* encourages clients to seek financing through traditional lenders. CFEI is also a source of alternate financing for qualifying clients within East Interlake geographic boundaries who are unable to obtain sufficient financing through traditional means. Interest rates are fixed for the term and repayment terms are set at a maximum of 10 years.

CFEI provides this higher-risk lending via:

- ✧ General Loan Investment Fund – up to \$150,000
- ✧ Micro Loan Program – up to \$20,000
- ✧ Entrepreneurs with Disability Loan Investment Fund – up to \$150,000
- ✧ Western Youth Entrepreneur Loan Investment Fund – up to \$25,000
- ✧ Youth Micro Loan Program – up to \$4,000

Community Economic Development Planning

Community Futures East Interlake's goal is to diversify and strengthen East Interlake's economic foundation and opportunities.

Community Economic Development (CED) is defined as local people acting to stimulate, create and promote the economic potential of a community and enhance its social conditions and quality of life. CED is a vital community-directed process that is often the most overlooked yet most valuable aspect of community growth. Without proper planning and discussion, tangible growth can be difficult to achieve.

Community and Strategic Planning is a formal facilitation process which extracts vital opinions and goals and provides planning assistance to help develop a logical road map for the community to follow. Communities, service groups and organizations benefit tremendously when past accomplishments are reviewed and future goals established.

By creating partnerships with communities in the region, their agencies and organizations, *Community Futures East Interlake* provides an advisory role in solving long-term economic problems. This helps to identify opportunities and capitalize on project and product development.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Community Futures East Interlake operates under the guidance of a Board of Directors. There are eleven volunteer community representatives nominated by their Municipal Councils that oversee the activities of CFEI.

ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND GOVERNANCE

- Board members have a vision of where *Community Futures East Interlake* needs to be going to encourage growth and development of our communities and the region. They have the principle responsibility for establishing and carrying out *CFEI's* mission and strategic objectives.
- Board members establish a clear organizational mission, develop a clear, long-range strategic plan and govern its operation by setting out the priorities, establishing the goals and objectives for *CFEI* then evaluating the plan's success.
- Directors are fully versed with the organization's goals, objectives, programs and services, projects, budget processes and financial situation. They regularly review monthly staff activity and financial reports and have a clear understanding of them. They accept responsibility for overseeing administration, assets, liabilities, contracts and overall policies of the organization. They ensure all disbursements, agreements and contracts are board-authorized.
- Board members are governed by the communities they represent. They effectively provide governance for the corporation, keeping board and staff focused on the issues that are important to the region and its communities, yet delegate the day-to-day operational matters and implementation of its policies to the management.
- Every board member is a "trustee" of *CFEI's* finances. They protect the integrity of *CFEI's* finances by establishing and approving financial policies, including annual operating budgets. They set the budget in support of the *CFEI's* activities and monitor expenditures. They work with management to ensure there are regular, clear and detailed financial reports provided to the board.
- Board members ensure accountability of the organization to government and participating communities. They ultimately accept legal responsibility for the organization.
- Board members and management regularly review their programs and services to ensure that the corporation's offerings reflect future rather than past needs of the community/region that it serves. They continue to be "leaders of change".
- Board members are knowledgeable, have diverse backgrounds and skills, and they bring these skills and experience to the corporation and to our communities. They are willing to share their knowledge and expertise. They encourage staff training and professional development and are always willing to take training themselves.
- Board members have a positive impact on our communities through bringing about change by actively participating at meetings and participating on committees and sub-committees. Enthusiastic about the activities of the corporation, they bring tremendous energy to the work of community and business development.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

- Board members are community leaders who volunteer their time to provide community-based direction and support to the corporation. They provide a source for new directions for *CFEI* by capturing new community opportunities and ideas, bringing them to the attention of the organization for our participation. They effectively communicate the impact current *CFEI* activities are having on the community.
- The essential link between *CFEI* and their communities, directors are representative of the developmental interests and needs of their communities. They play a vital role in their community's economic development and diversification by bringing the needs and interests of the community, region and local organizations back to *CFE*, and vice-versa.
- Acting on behalf of their constituents, board members are accountable to their communities. They work hard to mobilize their communities to achieve stronger, more sustainable, diversified futures for their communities.



- Board members take on regional projects. They participate on sub-committees as required to assist communities to successfully implement identified economic diversification strategies.
- Board members represent *CFEI* in the community, actively marketing and promoting our services. They are ambassadors to *CFEI*, lobbying on behalf of the organization, the region, and their communities.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

- Members of the board oversee the delivery of the loans programs, making all lending and Self-Employment Program approval decisions. They decide loan approvals, loan amounts and repayment terms. Board members assess the availability of funds and ensure that all financial resources of *CFEI* are utilized effectively.
- Board members provide an ongoing review of existing client files and bring knowledge of community needs into the business loan decision. As much as possible, they contribute input about the character of the loan clients within their communities. Keeping an ear to the ground, directors provide an informal monitoring of client business activities within their communities.
- Our loan committee members bring a wide variety of expertise to the table. They have experience in running a business, understanding cash flows, understanding the local consumer, etc. They offer this experience to all loan decisions.

She offers business counseling, planning assistance, business start-up, financing assistance, project development and training development. She helps you find the business resources you need to succeed.

Eugene Zalevich, *Economic Development Analyst*

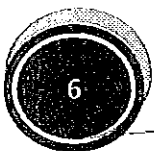

Phil joined *CFEI* in June 2010. Phil manages the corporations administrative and loans accounting operations.





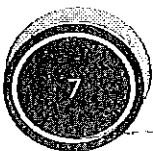

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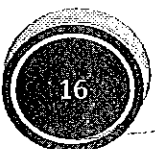

1. ENTITY DEFINITION

Community Futures East Interlake Inc. is a community based organization that provides loans and financial services to small businesses in the North Interlake Region of Manitoba that are otherwise unable to obtain financing, and also provides community economic development services. The program which is being funded by the Community Futures Program was formed to foster the economic development of the region. The Corporation was incorporated under the Manitoba Companies Act as a non-profit organization on April 20, 1985. It is exempt from income taxes under the Income Tax Act section 149. (d), as a non-profit organization.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. The following are considered to be the more significant policies:

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized in the period they are earned. Funds from external parties and earnings thereon restricted by agreement are accounted for as deferred revenue until used for the specified purpose.

Investments

Investments held by the Corporation consist of term deposits.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Purchased property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost less recoverable GST. New asset purchases are expensed and then set up as property, plant, or equipment. No amortization is taken on the capital assets.

Use of Estimates

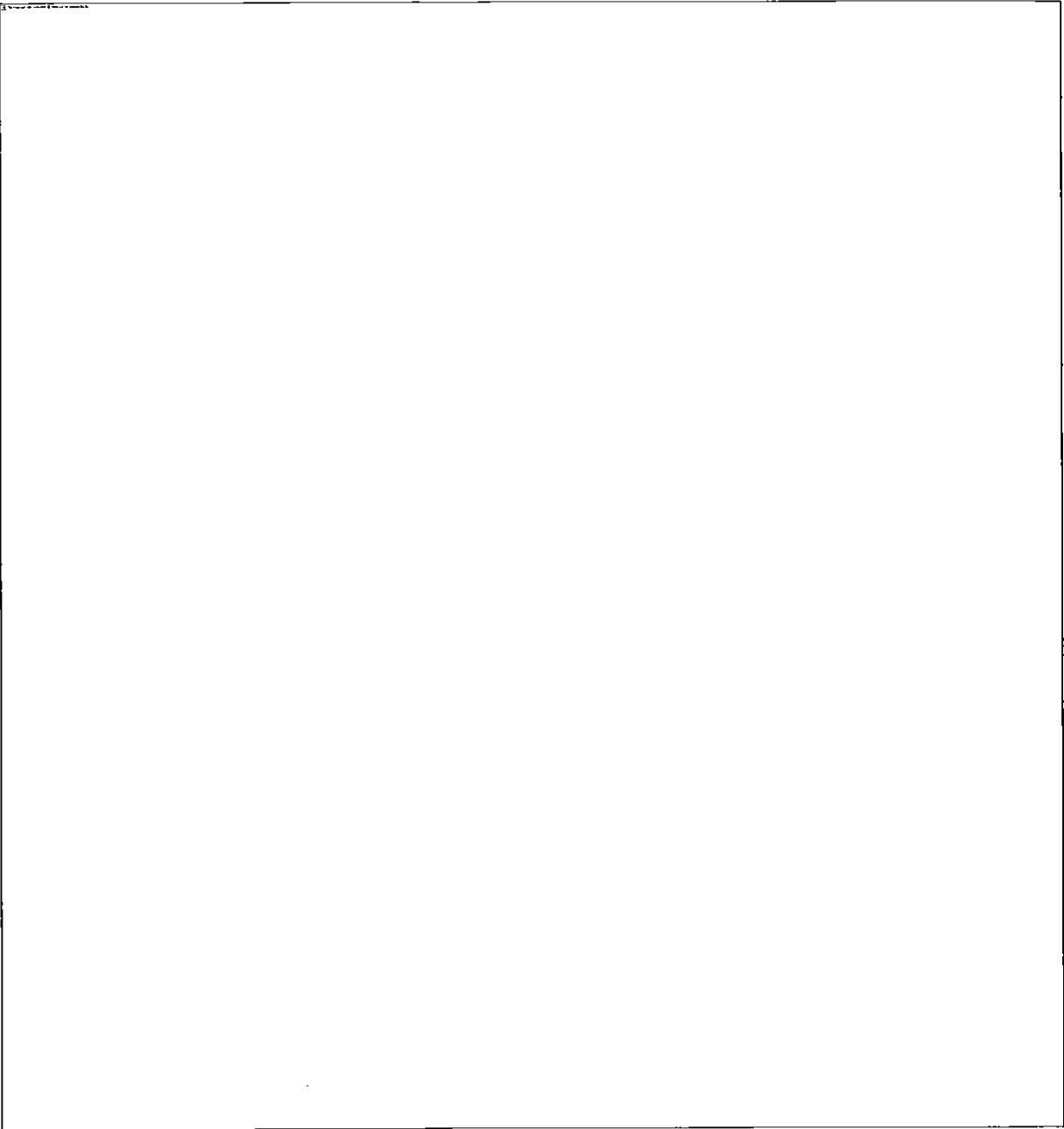
The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and, as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known.

3. LOAN GUARANTEES

Loan guarantees are term deposits that have been committed as security for client loans at various financial institutions for the purpose represented by the Board of Directors in its Corporate Mandate. These term deposits are therefore subject to potential loss. As of March 31, 2011 loan guarantees total \$208,000.

10. REPAYABLE TO W.E.D.

The Corporation is in receipt of monies from the Government of Canada to provide loans to specific groups in their mandate area. These were:

- 1) \$75,000 to provide a repayable Investment fund.
- 2) \$200,000 to provide a repayable disabled person investment fund.
- 3) \$200,000 to provide a repayable Youth Investment Fund.

The repayment commencement date has not been determined under the terms and conditions of the agreement with the Government of Canada.

The amount repayable may be adjusted as the outstanding loans in this fund are not fully collected at this time. Future losses that have not been realized may require an offset adjustment against the outstanding commitment.

11. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial instruments of the Corporation consist mainly of cash, accrued interest receivable, accounts receivable, and accounts payable. The carrying values of these financial assets and liabilities approximate their fair values based on their short term maturity.

The fair value of the loans receivable and repayable to W.E.D. have not been presented as these values are not readily determinable.

Credit Risk Management

The Corporation is exposed to credit risk on the accounts receivable from its customers. In order to reduce its credit risk; the Corporation has adopted credit policies which include the analysis of the financial position of its customers and the regular review of their line limits.

The Corporation does not have a significant exposure to any individual customer or counterpart. Its customers are mainly small business owners.

12. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

Community Futures East Interlake Inc. receives at least 80% of its operating revenue from the Department of Western Economic Diversification, a sub-division of the federal government, and is economically dependent on it. The present contract the Company has with the Department expires March 31, 2011.

13. STATEMENT OF CASH FLOWS

A Statement of Cash Flows has not been provided as it would not provide any further information to the users of the financial statements.

17. COMMUNITY FUTURES INVESTMENT FUND

Community Futures East Interlake Inc. has contributed to the Community Futures Investment Fund, a fund administered by Community Futures Manitoba Inc. to provide loans to regional Community Futures organizations. As of March 31, 2011, Community Futures East Interlake Inc. has \$360,000 principal, plus accrued interest of \$59,905 invested in the fund. The amount is recallable and therefore recorded as a current asset in the financial statements.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

On behalf of the board and staff, welcome to our 2010/2011 annual general meeting. This year Community Futures East Interlake (CFEI) saw an increase in the number of the east Interlake communities working on community development projects in their respective communities. There has been a larger demand for CFEI's community development services; mainly due to the challenges facing many of the Interlake communities. Many are struggling with issues such as housing and the decline in the agriculture industry. The weather and the economy have each affected the way our communities are working and expanding. The traditional tourism and agriculture sectors in the region have each been impacted by weather and the economy in the past few years. This is creating the need for communities to adapt and to come up with creative solutions.

Our business development support service hours also saw a major increase over the past few years. The need for support to existing businesses over the past year seems to be one of the trends that developed; due to in some part the struggles we have seen in the communities. Many businesses were in the need of support services to assist them through some tough times. Our office worked very closely with a number of businesses in the region that were struggling and in need of additional supports. This meant we were spending more time on a one-to-one basis with many of our clients.

Our office successfully hosted numerous events over the year to celebrate our 25th anniversary, and was able to look back at some of the major accomplishments over the past twenty-five years, including the Lakeview Hotel Project in Gimli. It was a time to reflect on what we have done and to start looking at the future. Over the history of the program over 101 directors have served on our board. They have helped us deliver our programs and gave countless hours of volunteer time to the program.

Over the past twenty-five years, our business services have now provided over \$6.8 million to business start-ups and expansions to over 250 businesses. We have provided over 5000 advisory services to our clients and have worked with numerous other funders over the years to assist our local entrepreneurs with their projects.

I wish to thank the board and staff for all of their hard work this past year. This year we lost some long serving directors – Steve Lupky, Dennis Dandeneau, Les Marchuk & Joe Thievin. On behalf of the board, I wish to send my sincerest thanks to them for all of their hard work over the years.

GENERAL MANAGER'S CORPORATE OVERVIEW

FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2010/2011

This year has been one of change to our organization and communities. Changes that included a definition in the new staff roles (all staff providing business and community services), new board members, and a change in some of the partners we work with. There also have been many changes in our local leaders/municipal politicians. There are many new faces on our councils and on our community boards. This has led to new viewpoints and increased leadership development and learning opportunities.

As we celebrated our twenty-fifth anniversary as an organization, we had a chance to look back at the program and regions' history. What we saw was that we are still seeing many of the same issues from twenty-five years ago – such as dependency on our resource based economy sectors (agriculture, tourism, water) and rural depopulation. Clearly this supports the ongoing need for the Community Futures program. These issues continue to exist; however, there are now new challenges with the changing economy – decline in rural retail (due to increased mobility, internet access/usage etc), aging infrastructure in rural communities, and the overall effects of weather on the agriculture sector and tourism. Some of our rural communities are suffering (dependency on agriculture sector) and others are seeing expansions that are creating new problems such as lack of housing for workers and a need for new infrastructure/replacement of existing (sewer, water etc).

Communities are adapting to these changes, however trying to find their niche as a community and be ready for what changes may come their way is becoming increasingly important. Communities have to be ready for opportunities as they come their way, and also need to be able to create the opportunities. Communities are recognizing the need to be reactive to and plan for change and are starting to work on the how they can be ready for change (creation/revitalizing of CDCs and community groups).

Community Futures East Interlake is continuing to evolve its services as needed, which has meant a greater emphasis on our community services and counseling for existing business. We worked with many business and community groups to meet the challenges they are facing in their business and communities. We have seen an increased need for our planning services and community development support services this past year and have worked more closely with many businesses than in previous years. The local economy has been suffering, this has meant fewer loans. We have however; been more directly involved in saving some valuable businesses in the region or helping our businesses find additional programs and resources.

Our organization worked with many community partners and we are very fortunate to get many different government organizations and community partners working on projects such as the Business Start in Fisher River. We are very thankful to all of the partners that worked with us to provide additional services in the region.

This year we said goodbye to some of our long serving directors – Steve Lupky, Dennis Dandeneau, Les Marchuk and Joe Thievin. We will miss their support of our program and wish to thank them for all of their efforts on behalf of our program. Of course, we would not exist if it were not for all the hard work and dedication of the current board members and staff. To them I say thank you and may we continue to work to grow our communities and region.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT REPORT

FISCAL YEAR 2010/2011

The Community Futures East Interlake (CFEI) region can be characterized by its diversity and strong base of natural resources (lakes, agricultural land, peat moss, limestone etc). The past years have seen numerous changes to the primary industries. Community Futures East Interlake has worked within the region and plays an active support role with several community groups and organizations.

Community Support Services

Community Futures East Interlake is a resource to communities in the region and offers a variety of community support services such as community planning, project assistance, market surveys & data collection, funding applications and research assistance. Several of the projects and initiatives that Community Futures East Interlake was involved with in the 2010/2011 fiscal year are highlighted below:

Community Planning

Community Futures East Interlake provided facilitation services ranging from community planning, strategic planning, strategic management planning and public meetings for the following organizations:

- Riverton-Bifrost CDC
- Winnipeg Beach
- Arborg-Bifrost Community Development Corporation

Project Assistance

Community Futures East Interlake provided project assistance to several organizations/initiatives:

Interlake Pioneer Trail (IPT):

In 2010/2011 CFEI continued to work with the Interlake Pioneer Trail organization and the three management groups responsible for the trail. The Interlake Snowmobile Association operated the full trail during the winter months, and the South Interlake ATV club as well as The Prime Meridian Trail Association manages a section during the spring, summer and fall months. The trail remains a valuable resource for the region and is an opportunity to develop tourism initiatives along the trail.

GPS Tourism Database/Tourism Database

In partnership with the Interlake Tourism Association, our office completed a database of GPS waypoints of over 500 tourism business and attractions. The database has been used in the Interlake Tourism Guidebook (12,500 copies printed) that has been distributed throughout the region.

Fisher River Business Training

In partnership with the Ochekwi-Sipi Economic Development Corporation (Fisher River First Nations), Manitoba Entrepreneurship, Training and Trade and the Aboriginal Business Service Network, entrepreneur workshops were held. The business start was delivered to over 10 participants in Fisher

River and two pilot project sessions were held in Riverton and Fisher River regarding a customer service workshop. The customer service workshop was created to be a shorter version of training currently available to allow participants to get an understanding of customer service without missing a full day of work. Twenty-five people participated in the pilot workshops.

Interlake Business Assistance Guide

In partnership with MAFRI, our office updated an Interlake Business Assistance Guide and funded a portion of the production cost. The guide is given to all business clients and provides information on rural business and community programs for the Interlake.

Immigration:

Community Futures East Interlake continues to partner with Manitoba Agriculture, Food and Rural Initiatives as well as a number of local service providers including school divisions and municipalities to provide settlement services to recent immigrants to the region. CFEI continues to work with the group and help them to provide immigration services in the region. This year CFEI worked with the group to secure a \$20,000 grant for a project to create awareness of cultural diversity and demonstrate that all the people are the same. The grant application was approved, however the organization was not able to commit to completing the project.

East Interlake Community Development Project Support Initiative (EICDPSI):

The EICDPSI grant program is jointly administered by Community Futures East Interlake and the Interlake Development Corporation. The grant program provides funding in support of community support initiatives that stimulate economies in the CFEI region. The projects primarily focus is on projects that create employment or the attraction of new residents to the region. The projects total grant funds available this year was \$40,000. In the program's Third year, the fund was able to support six organizations. The following projects were approved for funding on 2010/2011:

Stonewall-Drop in Phase 2 of Expansion

The project saw the development of a skate board park including ramps, tables, benches and landscaping. The Drop in Center is a main meeting point in the community. The center is active with kids and the center rents out meeting space for other community groups.

Winnipeg Beach - Reintroducing ice to the arena

The arena was once again developed as an ice arena. This further encouraged winter recreation in the Winnipeg beach area. The facility has been active meeting point for locals and visitors.

Riverton - Campgrounds Feasibility Area Study

The project is to survey a couple of potential areas to see which area would be best utilized in developing a camp ground. With a location established the group can further work towards making Riverton another camping destination for travelers to come visit and stay.

Arborg - Prairies East Sustainable Agriculture Initiative (PESAI) - Diversification Research Centre

The project has assisted in getting land purchased and site prepared for a future research center. This crop research center will help the agricultural sector in the region find and develop

new crops and to look at ways to increase the suitability for new crops and obtain higher yielding crops.

Teulon - Rockwood Arena Canteen

Project approved to renovating the kitchen in the arena. The group is upgrading the kitchen to commercial standards. This will increase the uses for the arena.

Stony Mountain - Soccer & Baseball fields

The project is developing two soccer fields and two additional baseball fields. The Stony Mountain Community Association group has brought outdoor sports activities back to the community which was nearly vacant only a few years ago.

These projects all provided great opportunities in attracting new residents to the communities. The projects could not have been completed without the countless efforts of community volunteers who made these projects a reality.

The next project intake date is September 30 2011.

Special Projects

Entrepreneurs with Disabilities (EDP) Program Mentorship Projects – CFEI secured mentorship contracts for two EDP clients this year. The program provided business mentors to EDP clients in need of additional assistance in their business and maintained two existing long term businesses in the region..

Entrepreneurs with Disabilities Pilot Project Program – Motivational Interviewing: CFEI organized a two day Motivational Training session. We had staff from 10 CF offices and 6 Service Providers in the area that took part in this innovative client counseling technique.

ABSN – Funding for two pilot project customer service training workshops and hosting Business Start in Fisher River was obtained through this program. Our office had 25 participants take part in the customer service workshop and 10 people participate in the Business Start program in Fisher River.

Memberships - CFEI is an active member of Economic Development Association of Manitoba (EDAM), the Interlake Regional Economic Development Association and the Manitoba Food Processors Association.

Mentorship - Our office acts as a mentor to other Community Futures organizations regarding various issues such as TEA and organizational and lending practices.

Junior Achievement – CFEI’s staff provided entrepreneurship training to two grade 5 classes in Riverton – “Our Business Entrepreneurship Training.

Networking/Training – Numerous events and conferences were attended throughout the year by CFEI staff and board to support our program and develop our staff/board. CFEI staff and board attended events such as: CFM Board Meetings, CF Managers Meetings, CFM Annual Awards and Banquet, Vision Quest, Capturing Opportunities, EDAM Forums, Employment and Income Assistance Information Session, CDC meetings and chamber meetings.

Awards Banquet – Over 125 people attending the event in Arborg on October 28. Six categories were presented awards, including business of the year, youth volunteer and lifetime business achievement. Numerous nominations were received, and the top three from each category received tickets to the event. The event promoted our services to the region and celebrated the achievements of the East Interlake region. The events theme, Celebrating Past, Present and Future was designed to tie in with our 25th anniversary, and lead to the addition of the youth volunteer category, and a change to the lifetime award criteria.

25TH Anniversary Promotions –CFEI hosted various events throughout the year, such an open house and 25th celebration event on the day of our 25th. The events increased our exposure in the region, and articles were written in the local papers. Our office also had a 25th theme with all of the marketing items that went out.

MARKETING REPORT

Council & Community Visits

CFEI visited all the councils in the region to promote our services, past year’s accomplishments and new projects. CFEI has presented numerous presentations to groups such as Employment and Income Assistance, AIM for Work, MAFRI, community chambers and others community groups regarding our services. Staff visited all member communities regularly to promote CFEI services during meetings and special events.

Satellite Offices

CFEI has two satellite offices, located in Town of Teulon and RM of Rockwood offices. Each satellite office is staffed as needed and our services are extended in the region.

Video Conference Training

CFEI recently secured the services to once again provide the services in our region.



Joined Local Chambers

CFEI continued membership with all of the local chambers in our region. CFEI is working to market the CF program to and better connect directly with local businesses.

AGM/Strategic Planning

CFEI public AGM meeting was held. Advertisements were placed in local newspapers inviting the public to attend. CFEI held its annual strategic planning session in December. Board members and staff participated in session that discussed current issues in the region and planning for the next fiscal year.
